## Artist Talk Moderated by Linda Earle Focuses on Hudson Artist Shinique Smith

HUDSON, N.Y. – On Saturday, April 5 at 4pm the Hudson Opera House continues it's Artist Talks Series with Shinique Smith moderated by Linda Earle.

Shinique Smith, who lives and works in Hudson, creates artwork based on consumerism and personal narrative, drawing from influences ranging from graffiti to Japanese calligraphy. She has shown at the Brooklyn Museum, MoMA P.S.1, and the Studio Museum in Harlem, with works in the collections of LACMA, the Whitney, and the Denver Art Museum.

Smith is inspired by the vast vocabulary of things that we consume and discard. Examining the ways in which such objects can resonate on a personal and social scale, Smith pursues the graceful and spiritual qualities in the written word and the everyday object. Many found objects, ranging from old fabrics and discarded picture frames to sneakers and T-shirts make up much of Baltimore-native Smith's intriguing art. She sometimes incorporates street graffiti and Japanese calligraphy in works that are at once commentary on public consumption and personal reflection.

Moderator, Linda Earle has a worked in the visual performing and media arts as an educator, grant-maker, and advocate for artists and culture. She is currently the Executive Director the New York Arts Program, an academic and experiential program serving undergraduates working in the arts nationally. Before joining NYAP she served for ten years as the Executive

Director of Program for the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture, one of the nation's leading organizations for emerging visual artists. Earle has taught Film and Cultural Theory courses at Barnard and Hunter Colleges and at Rutgers University's Mason Gross School of the Arts and has curated visual arts and film exhibitions. She is currently President of the Board of the Art Matters Foundation, President of the Board of the Alliance for Inclusion in the Arts, and a Member of the Board of Director's for Poet's House.
